While this has been a year of hardships, with financial crises surrounding us, we also are surrounded by hope and strength at the College of Education. I'd like to share a remarkable story with you about one of our students who will graduate this month. Teresa Marie "Tressie" Smith has overcome tremendous odds to complete her master's degree. This is a holiday story that would even warm the heart of Ebenezer Scrooge:

Tressie Smith of Safford always wanted to have a family and be a stay-at-home mom while her children were young, but she knew

education could have a big impact on her life. As

she says, "I felt that getting my education was important, and it's a good thing I did because I have ended up needing it." That's because her husband and three of her four children have been diagnosed with progressive visual impairment, a familial condition they did not know about.

She says, "In 2001, my husband went to the doctor to get a new pair of contacts and was basically told he was going blind and that he could no longer drive. The news was very devastating and scary. I cried a lot in private, but I always tried to be brave on the outside, even though I really didn't feel brave."

As a result of learning how to adapt to her family's needs, she decided to become a teacher of visually impaired students. For the past four years, she has taken weekend courses in our programs in both Phoenix and Tucson while working full time as a teacher in Safford, Douglas, Sierra Vista, and some rural areas of Arizona. She's driven hundreds of miles weekly to attend classes and teach.

"There were times I wondered if I would really be able to reach my goal, or if I was crazy for even trying. I remember many late nights doing homework after already putting in a full day of work, only to be awakened in the middle of the night by a crying child, and then having to start all over again the next morning. My 6-year-old asked

In the 1950s, a Tucson Unified School District administrator, Herbert Cooper, was assigned the job of purchasing new sites for future schools TUSD might need as the city's population grew. One 10-acre site never was used for a school, and the pristine desert landscape is now known as the Cooper Center for Environmental Learning.

The College of Education recently partnered with TUSD to support the continuation of educational activities at the center. Now, people throughout the Tucson area will have the chance to experience the natural world and work on ways that we can live more appropriately in the desert. It's also a place to apply knowledge learned in classes, such as science, social studies, reading, and writing. UA students will have the opportunity to teach K-12 students and conduct important research.

We celebrated the new partnership in October with — appropriately — an alternative-energy event that included smoothies donated by Xoom Juice and blended on a human-powered bike blender, tours of the unspoiled grounds, and a look at the solar system that provides electricity for the office and the future location of the rainwater collection system, installed to reduce dependence on underground water.



To continue a portion of her work, Antia was awarded a four-year, \$800,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Education Office of Special Education Programs. The project begins in January.
